



School Resource Officers WORL Complete D.A.R.E. Officer Training

After recently spending an intense couple weeks in Columbus at an accredited training center, Lake Local's School Resource Officers (SROs) Dave McKay and Laura Blackstock are now certified D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) Officers.

Both officers agreed this training was the most valuable and beneficial that they've received while doing law enforcement work.

After receiving 80 hours of training, the officers have gained skills to present classroom lessons to multiple grades including K-3, fifth, and seventh grade. Topics range from self-esteem, decision making, interpersonal communications skills, the consequences of drug and alcohol abuse, to conflict resolution, risks and safe choices, cyber bullying, and positive alternatives to substance abuse.

McKay believes D.A.R.E. can provide students with important decision making skills. "This can be a turning point. This is where kids get an education in life. It goes back to stressing the risks associated with everything you do. Choices you make follow you," he said.

With training behind them, the officers are currently working with building principals, teachers and guidance counselors to find the best ways to insert the above D.A.R.E. topics into existing school curriculum. "There is a lot we want to do, said Officer Blackstock. It will be trial and error this year."

School Facilities Update

Thanks to local community support of our bond issue which passed in May, 2015, we are moving forward with school construction/remodeling to promote enhanced education for our students for the next 50 years.

Enhanced 21st century technology, improved safety and security, flexible learning space, and financial stability for the district are measures currently being pursued.

Following is the latest news regarding our various building projects:

- Architectural firm Sol Harris Day, Hammond Construction, and representative of the Ohio School Facilities Commission (OSFC) and Lake Local Schools have worked continuously for the past 17 months to plan our new buildings. As they conclude the Design/Development Phase, school construction documents are now between 75 -90 percent complete.
- Numerous visits to school districts throughout Ohio have been done by members of the Lake administrative team, teaching and classified staff to identify designs and systems that are most effective, efficient, and beneficial for learning. Districts visited include Beaver Local Schools, New Albany Plain Local Schools, and Jackson Local, Wayne County Joint Vocational School, and Grand Valley School.
- Completion of Uniontown Elementary's new playground is tentatively set for middle of November, 2016.
- Construction of our new Grades 2-6 and 7-12 buildings will both begin this spring, 2017 with occupancy expected by fall of 2018-19.
- New technology initiatives include computers being issued to students in grades 8-12, opening of Lake High School Hot Spot in Media Center including new, comfortable furniture, internet connectivity,

video production area, a 3D printer, and a quiet study area.

- Nine mobile computers with a 65" interactive touch screen are now located throughout the district, accessible to grades K-12.
- GenYes Career Tech program was introduced this fall at Lake High School, taught by Frank Pilato. LHS students learn Information Technology-related skills, enabling them trouble shoot and correct hardware issues, as well as provide instruction/professional development for staff/students about newer computer software.
- During next school year, 2017 2018, plans call for 1,100 to 1,200 additional laptop computers to be issued to students in grades 2-7 (computers will be provided via carts for classrooms students in these lower grades will not be able to take them home.)
- Summer of 2018 will be time of the big move! Grades 7-8 will be moving to new/remodeled 7-12 buildng; grades 2-6 will be moving to new elementary school; grades K-1 will be moving temporarily to current middle school building while intensive remodeling is done at Uniontown Elementary.
- Currently our school construction projects are on schedule, and on budget.

Township Snow Plows are Perfectly Painted by Pupils

When snow flies again in Lake Township this winter, local families will see colorful designs painted on street department snow plows created by student artists from each of our school buildings!

Thanks to a special collaboration between the Lake Township Trustees (and Road Department) and Lake Local Schools, one snow plow was loaned to each Lake school building this fall to receive artistic treatment with acrylic paint and sealer by students. Their deadline to finish is mid-November.

Dan Kamerer, Lake Township Roads Superintendent, approached Lake administrators during the fall of 2015 about painting their snow plows, after hearing about it being done elsewhere. Lake's administration thought it was a great idea and agreed to it. Lake's art teachers also agreed to the idea, but unfortunately it was too late to do any painting last fall because snow arrived in the township.

However, it was agreed to prepare for this project earlier this year, so discussions regarding plow designs were on the drawing tables at school buildings after school started this fall.

Hartville/Lake art teacher Jamie Stegner is leading the creative effort on one plow , while Joni Susa is directing artists on the other. Miss Stegner's final plow design includes the silly snowman Olaf, from Frozen, who is 'thinking warm thoughts' on a beach.

"It will be exciting to see the bright colors coming down the road against the gray winter backdrop! As we painted, I talked to the students about how their lively, energetic artwork has the power to bring a smile to a stranger's face and joy to someone's winter morning!," said Miss Stegner.

Meanwhile, Joni Susa's plow is being completed mostly by Lake Elementary fifth graders and a few younger students whose family members work for the township.

"Each student artist participating will make their mark by adding fill color and designs in the piece. Several students came up with sketches that were assessed, and pulled as inspiration for the main idea. Our design is a surfing snowman with some penguins doing the dab and judging the snowman's gnarly moves!," said Mrs. Susa.

At Lake Middle School, Mrs. Boxler's 26 Art Enrichment students are painting snowflakes on their plow – one flake will be painted by each student. It's fun – this is my first snow plow project!," said Mrs. Boxler.

Kindergarten

Hartville Elementary Kindergarten students began their school year by reading many stories about Pete the Cat. They also saw that they would have a great year because their *magic dough* changed colors for each and every one of them!

In addition to classroom rules and routines, students have been working with letters, sounds, and seasons. They love using Play Dough, shaving cream, sand, rubber bands, and many other hands-on activities to learn. They are also learning how to write and read numbers, sort, and count.

As fall approached the kindergarteners learned about apples, and used them in many different ways. Students sorted, graphed, tasting apples, and making a special apple treat. We discovered we are very good chefs! The students took part in the Read, Move, and Groove Fundraiser sponsored by the amazing PTO at Hartville Elementary, which provided each student with a slushy for our warm days! Both students and teachers look forward to the rest of our fun fall activities.

First Grade Artists Explore MUDPAINTING while Learning About CAVE ART

Joni Susa and Jamie Stegner's first grade artists at Hartville Elementary experienced mud paint as an expressive medium this fall! We obtained dirt after getting permission from the construction manager of the grades 2-6 building construction zone then added water and



food coloring to make mud paint during our Cave Art Study. We learned that most cave art paintings are more than 30,000 years old, dating to prehistoric times, and they represent the earliest art which has survived. It has been discovered all over the world and typically depicts animals, humans, weapons, and symbols, using colors found in the natural environment.



First graders explored cave paintings of France Lascaux, through virtual tours, then imagined that they had gone back to prehistoric times. We turned out the lights, listened to sounds from inside the caves, and used our fingers brushes) to paint with charcoal, oil pastels, and of course, mud!

First Graders Read, Move, and Groove



First graders enjoyed Read, Move, and Groove by completing an obstacle course, showing off their dance moves, listening to a story, and walking around the park. Congratulation to Karla Nalepa's class, who raised the most money in first grade. In class, students studied apples by observing apples, and dissecting, tasting,

writing, learning facts, and making graphs about them. Students even made their own applesauce, and enjoyed an apple party.



Next, we participated in a program called Walk This Way, sponsored by Stark County Health Department Safe Kids. First graders learned a lot about health and safety. Finally, we want to say thank you to all of the parents who came to parent teacher conferences; It was great to share your students' success and growth with you. A BIG thank you to all the grandparents who attended Grandparents Day.

Third Grade



Third graders completed their Oil Spill Clean Up activity, learning how difficult oil is to remove from water and how messy it can be! Mr. Smith taught students about his job, which allows him to remove oil spills on land, and how pads absorb the oil.

Our next unit will expose students to two leaders of preservation, John Muir and Rachel Carson. Both focused attention on our National Parks, and the importance of clean land, air, and water. Students will go to the park to look at trees, leaves, and all the life that lives in the ground. Teachers want to instill the importance of our environment and protecting it for generations to come.

Having Fun with Pigs!

Second graders at Hartville Elementary are studying and reading different versions of *The Three Little Pigs*. Students compared and contrasted the different stories, as well as the pig's version of the story, and the wolf's. Students also participated in The Reader's Theatre version of the story by choosing if they wanted to be an actor, a costume creator for the actors, or a scenery designer for the production. Students performed the production in different classrooms. Finally, students also built a house to withstand the huff and puff of the big, bad wolf!

Five New Watercolor Techniques for Fifth Grade Artists!

Students also learned academic watercolor techniques by experimenting with a wash,

salting, masking, using wet-on-wet, and controlled

splatter to create an underwater background. Students then concentrated on space and composition to create an ocean creature using metal engraving techniques, and adding elements of pattern and design on foil.



Fifth Grade Science

Students have been hard at work in fifth grade learning how to be good scientists. We are focusing on creating controlled experiments. Students have been experimenting with pendulums of different



lengths, gummy worms, and life boats.

Fun Times in Fourth Grade!

In language arts, we've been learning about and analyzing the elements of fiction. We have focused on writing summaries of stories in good, complete sentences. In social studies, we've learned map reading skills, and have even put our skills to the test on Google Maps! We've also learned about the different regions in Ohio, and how humans have affected the environment of Ohio. Mason's journey to become a therapy dog began at the University of Kentucky where he was born and started his training. From there, Mason participated in the "Prison Pups" program. He is now finishing his training with ADAI (Assistance Dog for Achieving Independence) in Toledo, Ohio. Because of these experiences, Mason is now a highly trained therapy dog who has passed a multitude of tests to be given the official title of school therapy dog.

Shirley Oberdier, the school counselor at Lake Elementary, and **Katy Yoder**, the school counselor at Hartville Elementary, will be

trained as Mason's handlers at school. They began this exciting journey with ADAI more than four years ago. ADAI currently has 14 therapy dogs placed within Ohio school districts and in neighboring states. They place approximately one school therapy dog per year and finally our time has come; Mason has proven to be the perfect fit for our schools!

The "paws-itive" impact Mason will make in our schools will be drastic! Mason will be used in our schools in the following ways:

School Counselor: Mason will support students in the school counseling office and help to provide immediate rapport building and trust between school counselor and students. Mason will help students feel more comfortable and willing to visit the school counselor, especially when talking about difficult things. He will also be an incredible resource for students experiencing anxiety.

Teacher: Mason will be included in lesson planning and behavioral plans/systems where time spent with him is a reward. Teachers may have students read to Mason, and/or present projects/assignments to him in order to build their self-esteem.

School Climate: Mason will greatly improve the overall mood and climate within the school and community. Mason will become a common thread that all students can relate to when he is incorporated into school-wide activities.







The students have shown professionalism and troubleshooting skills as they have helped both students and teachers. GenYes has also helped teachers to integrate technology into their classes.

Beginning Nov. 1, 2016, the officers hope to begin leading their D.A.R.E. programming through the district. They plan to present brief 10-minute talks to students at both Hartville and Uniontown Elementary about stranger danger, calling 911, and keeping dangerous substances out of their mouth

A special emphasis will also be placed on D.A.R.E. programming at fifth and seventh grade. School Counselor Shirley Oberdier at Lake Elementary will assist the officers at Lake Elementary, while at Lake Middle School, it will be Bryan Rector and Jessica McLouth. Tentative plans for fifth graders include writing a D.A.R.E. essay through language arts classes, and doing a poster contest through art classes. 




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Congratulations Boys Golf


